The training also addresses health equity, including perinatal equity as well as maternal and child health.

The One Key Question certification training focuses on starting the conversation with patients about pregnancy desires. Any type of provider, whether an administrative staff, frontline staff or support staff, can take the One Key Question training and become certified. By offering the training online, Power to Decide is able to integrate a suite of interactive teachings for non-clinical and clinical providers alike.

In fact, One Key Question has been <u>studied by a number of researchers</u> on measures such as health care quality, patient experience and satisfaction and patient outcomes and has shown positive results.

The <u>American Medical Association</u> supports the use of pregnancy desire and contraceptive screening as part of routine well-care. And One Key Question is already used by thousands of health care and social service providers including clinicians, community health workers and home visiting nurses as well as large health systems and state and local public health departments in approximately 30 states.
